Meteorological Miscellanea

My favourite time of day to step out in Carlops is late evening. Tractors have ceased rumbling by, articulated lorries have reached their destination, white van man has finished his deliveries, and the boy racers have given us a break. I can hear the trickle of the Carlops Burn and the towit of an owl and occasionally an answering towoo. Sometimes it is pitch dark, sometimes there is a canopy of stars, sometimes there is moonlight, very occasionally there is the greatest show on Earth. On the evening of 10th October, the Aurora Borealis gave me its finest show since April 2000. I stood in awe for 15 minutes watching the pulsating red wash across the heavens.

Another show came from the Hunter Moon which was HUGE and fiery as it rose in the NE. The full moon demanded a double take when first spotted. The Hunter Moon follows September's Harvest Moon when animals have fewer places to hide in harvested fields. It's also known as the Travel Moon and the Kindly Moon.

The 14th of October was a remarkable day in as much as the sun shone - unusual for this year. In fact, it shone for an uninterrupted 9.3 hours from sunrise to sunset. The blue sky hosted a few wisps of Cirrus and some saltires - evidence of the passage of folk in tubes on some Great Circle flights above 30,000 feet.

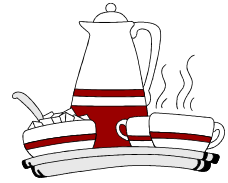

Linton Lifts – Appeal

A not-for-profit group

Offering you opportunities to be a good neighbour

Could you spare a few hours occasionally to take a neighbour to a medical appointment? Linton Lifts gives you the chance to make new friends in your own area by offering a door-to-door service to wherever the appointment is, since in some cases it takes three buses to get there and three buses back. Patients are often in an anxious state, and perhaps are quite elderly and/or no longer driving – a friendly face can make all the difference.

Drivers are reimbursed by the statutory mileage allowance and clients are simply asked to make a donation to Linton Lifts to cover this. Clients must be able to access a car without assistance (we cannot take wheelchair users, sorry) but we do take along carers when required.

We are in the foothills of running this service and in order to feel able to advertise it more widely **we need more drivers** to make themselves available so that no-one is asked to drive too frequently. When a request is made Margaret puts out a call to see who is available on the relevant day, so no need to have a day set aside on a regular basis – it's more whenever you happen to be free to help.

When the sermon saved the day

The sermon can never be too short. A common throwaway: half in jest, half in earnest; irreverent but not malign; at worst a bit inconsiderate of someone's effort to help, explain and prompt constructive thought. You will certainly have heard it said. How often have you heard someone say otherwise? You probably don't need both hands to count.

But here's a scenario that bucks the trend. A Carlops worshipper listens, responds, realises, panics, thinks, "persuades"(!), hopes fervently, is rescued. All *sotto voce* ...

Call to worship "Oh good, it's X this Sunday. Always interesting to hear. Provokes sometimes but helps too. Stirs up the brain cells and gets you thinking."

Reading "Ah; the feeding of the five thousand. Lots of options here. Wonder what path he'll take today."

Ten seconds later *Feeding? Feeding!* I forgot I'm supposed to be doing the coffee this morning. It's not set up for after the service. And worse – I've no milk with me. No biscuits either. Hordes of Carlops people expecting coffee (well, twenty anyway). All looking at me. Disappointed. What can I do-o-o?"

Blind panic, overridden by hymn, during which "Idea! Nudge other half. Whisper. 'Help. We're on coffee today.' (Clever – that change of pronoun, from I to we – sharing it!) 'But we didn't bring the stuff we need for it. You nip out during this hymn: West Linton Co-op or Shaz the newsagent: milk and biscuits. Back here asap and leave them in the kitchen and sneak back in. You'll just have time during the sermon – if you *really* move yourself.' Other half: 'OK: so, we need milk and biscuits. But how come it's me?' Moi, with severest hard Paddington stare: 'Just do it. Now!' Nods and goes. Thank goodness."

Hymn over – Reflection “Please go on for long enough. *But the coffee.* Hmm. Good point: yes. *But the coffee.* Uh-huh. Maybe; not so sure about ... *But the coffee.* That reminds me of ... *But the coffee.* Oh, I can’t focus! That’s hopeful: X says there are three points to make; so still two to go. *But the coffee.* Second point. Third. Oh good – a *but also.* And now a *last of all.* Lucky me! *But the coffee.* At least it’s a long last hymn; six verses. Oh no – we’re only going to sing four! Where is the other half? *What about the coffee?*

“Relief: here’s the other half. Back just on time. Huge sigh. Hymn ends. Benediction. ‘Amen, amen, a-a-a-men.’ Slip out to kitchen. Missing Murray’s mini-recital; that’s a shame. *But the coffee* matters and Murray will want some too.

“Just made it. Glad it was quite a long sermon this week. Phew!”

It goes to prove – a sermon *could* be too short – one day.
Though, of course, this couldn’t really happen. Could it?
