Our Minister

'American Dirt' - books worth reading

"This path is only for people who have no choice, no other option, only violence and misery behind you...Many will be maimed or injured. Many will die. Many, many of you will be kidnapped, tortured, trafficked, or ransomed ... every single one of you will be robbed."

The quote is a warning from a local priest ministering to those in the 'migrant caravan' from South and Central America. It comes from a novel I recently read called *American Dirt* by Jeanine Cummins. The tale centres around a horrific tragedy that forces Lydia, a young mother and her 9yr old son to join the migrant trail from Central America to the USA. The novel challenges you to check your moral compass and is a powerful reminder of the value and importance of kindness. There is a very poignant part of the story that tells of when Lydia begs for a ride with a busload of young American missionaries. They are initially met with hesitant resistance prompting one character to ask, "Are they just drive-by Samaritans?" ... "Do they just want to make pancakes and take selfies with skinny brown children?"

The hesitancy of those responsible for the young group of missionaries is not one of callous indifference but struggling with the dilemma of weighing up the risk and their responsibility. The encounter causes Lydia to remember a time when before the horrific circumstances that forced her to take such a desperate pathway to a hoped-for safety, she too was only superficially aware of the plight of migrants. When she half-heartedly listened to news items and wondered with the "detached fascination of the comfortable elite, how dire the conditions of their lives must be wherever they came from, that this is the better option." This novel is not an easy story to read but it is one well worth reading. It is rooted in real life interviews with migrants and that is what gives the story its visceral impact. In the present climate it is a powerful reminder that every migrant is a human being with their own story of desperation and longing.

prison, [unless]...
prison is safer
than a city of fire.'

Meteorological Miscellanea

I woke at 2.45 to the sound of sleet on the Velux window. I knew that Eowyn was on the doorstep, then came the rising of the wind. It was time for some explosive cyclogenesis, a 'weather bomb'. We had been told to stay at home, there were to be no buses. It was to be an ugly day but let's start with Hogmanay.

31st December was wet, 1.3 in/29mm, the second wettest day of the year. The Carlops Burn was up. The year was the 8th wettest in 29, with 52.16 in/1325mm. The evening of the 31st was dry and mild (47°F/8.3°C), but windy. Edinburgh cancelled, Carlops did not.

New Year's Day was wet – 0.82 in/21mm – rain turning to snow, lying snow. The next 10 days were wonderful for winter lovers with more snow, and more sunshine than in the whole of December. Four of those had wall to wall sunshine. The Pentland Hills turned pink with each sunrise and sunset. Six days were "sub-zero". I recorded a minimum of 17.5°F/-8.1°C on the 10th. The following day Altnaharra in Sutherland recorded -18.96°C/-2°F – the coldest January night in 15 years.

On 13th January we got the big thaw and Carlops Burn was up again. Did anyone see the orange moonrise on the 17th? Snowdrifts by the A702 and on the Pentland Hills lasted until the 20th. Then we had a dull but dry spell until the arrival of Eowyn.

Eowyn was well publicised and well forecast — even a brief sunny spell around 3pm materialised. Southwesterly winds gusting to Beaufort Force 12 were to last for 12 hours. Force 12 is the highest figure in the Beaufort Scale — hurricane force. Drumalbin, which is just 20 miles from Carlops to the NW of Tinto, recorded 101mph. Stronger gusts were recorded in Ireland. As the storm peaked in mid-afternoon, the roar was awesome, the bending of the trees remarkable. You will all have your own tales to tell —

our greenhouse was demolished and two Scots Pine trees in our wood were flattened but at least we still have a roof over our heads.

Heriot-Watt Chaplaincy Annual Public Lecture 2025 - Are Humans Unique? Monday 3rd Feb 6.15pm – 8.15pm, James Watt Centre, Heriot-Watt campus

A neuroscientific exploration of mind, soul and consciousness with Dr Sharon Dirckx.

Each year, the Chaplaincy hosts an annual public lecture that looks at a current issue or scientific development and explores the relationship of science and faith. Are they mutually exclusive, or might they combine to offer deeper insights into the world as we know it?

This year, we are delighted to welcome Dr Sharon Dirckx, speaker, author and former brain imaging scientist, to give the lecture.

Dr Dirckx will consider different philosophical and scientific approaches to the essence of humanity. Taking a materialist approach to mind, soul and consciousness; realising that matter is not all you need to explain everything about understanding humans. She will show how clinical neuroscience shows a complex picture together with theological considerations.


16 March – The Seed and the Sower
