

Christmas Thoughts

If we are to celebrate in a Christian way, there must be within ourselves a Shepherd and a King.

A Shepherd who can listen out for what others cannot hear: who with all his powers of devotion, lives immediately under the starry heavens, to whom the angels are happy to reveal themselves.

A King who knows how to give, who does not allow himself to be guided by anything other than the Star in the heights, who sets out to place all his gifts before the crib.

But beside the Shepherd and the King there must also be a Child within us who now wishes to be born.



Communion Sunday 12 January 2019, 10am

We will be celebrating Communion and all are welcome to attend.

Advent is a season which often feels as though it is only a warm-up act for the main event, regarded as less important if not unimportant and to be experienced only as a time of anticipation rather than appreciated for the gift it brings. It is offered as a gift of waiting, and yet is so often used as a repository for all the stuff we have to do, buy, prepare, rehearse and plan for the big day. However, although waiting can be frustrating and evokes impatience, it also invites another experience which although difficult can bring true insight.

The people of God waited in the wilderness for 40 years before arriving home; Abraham and Sarah waited until old age before their promise was fulfilled; Jesus waited 40 days in the desert before his ministry truly began; the disciples waited in the darkness before the stone rolled away and new life emerged. The waiting time invited for them preparation, reflection, understanding, formation and a new way of discovering God's presence in the darkness as well as in the light.

This phase of Interim Ministry has been a time of waiting, although not in a passive way, for it has involved repentance, reflection, listening, preparation and formation rather than be seen only as an empty period or a warm-up bout before the real event of a new ministry. During Advent we light a candle each week as light increases in the darkness, and the hope is that a gradual illumination has dawned on us all as we have journeyed together. In doing so, we are more prepared for Christmas, and so we are more prepared for leaving this place and entering a new life and new ministry.

At the last meeting of the three Kirk Sessions we were able to identify the New Year as a time to hopefully step out of this waiting time into a new future. However, we do so in the awareness that the work does not end as there are discoveries to carry forward, insights to shape our thinking, new relationships to be nurtured, and a different way of living in community to be realised.

Christmas is a wonderful celebration, not that something new begins on the 25th of December, but a reminder of Immanuel *God With Us*, which means God is with us also throughout the waiting and anticipating, the mourning and the birthing, the repenting and the dedicating, in the wilderness and in the stable. Be open to receive God's blessing in the waiting time.

You keep us waiting.
You, the God of all time,
Want us to wait for the right time in which to discover
Who we are, where we must go,
Who will be with us, and what we must do.
So, thank you ... for the waiting time.
(words from long liturgy)

Interim Ministry Future

Please pencil in your diary the evening of Thursday 6th February 2020.

This is almost certainly confirmed as the meeting for all three congregations to gather with the visiting Transition Support Group (TSG) to reflect on the past 18 months and decide whether we are ready to draw this period of Interim Ministry to a conclusion. The TSG is formed of another Interim Minister, a member of the Interim Ministries Task Group (which has responsibility of all Interim and Transition Ministries) a representative from the Ministries Council, and one from Presbytery. We will be offered a few focussed questions to discuss and help us reflect in order to identify achievements as well as what is yet to be addressed.

A report with recommendations from the TSG will then go to Presbytery which will decide whether to accept it and 'sign-off' this interim ministry.

If all parties agree, then I will remain with you for a few months thereafter as Interim Moderator to assist with the next stage, especially the implications of the Presbytery Plan and future conversations with neighbours. This will fulfil the 18-24 month expectation of my journey with you.

11.30am: Sunday Worship Time Change at St Andrew's West Linton

From Sunday 6th January 2020 worship at St Andrew's West Linton will begin at 11.30am.

This is a change from the usual time of 11.15 and will run for a pilot period to be reviewed at the Stated Annual Meeting in March.

The Kirk Sessions of all three congregations in the linkage have discussed this over a period of time and have agreed to this change. The main reason is to allow time for the minister to be pastorally available to people at Carlops and Kirkurd & Newlands churches for brief conversations and even a quick coffee before travelling to West Linton. With the congregations sharing ministry it often means the minister heading off quickly when individuals would perhaps like a little conversation over a pastoral issue, discuss something which for them has arisen during worship, or to arrange a future meeting. The minister always has this opportunity at St Andrew's but not at the other churches on a normal Sunday. A minibus brings residents from Castle Craig Addiction Centre to worship at Newlands each week after dropping some off at the RC Church in Peebles arriving just before 10am. An earlier time of worship there would mean them being unable to attend an experience which is so much part of the healing for a number of residents. Both Kirkurd & Newlands and Carlops congregations appreciate this gift of time which they believe will enrich congregational life for them and their relationship with the minister. Thank you for your understanding.


