In recent items I have mentioned either overtly or obtusely the changing nature of church and society and how change is coming sooner than we may expect to reshape us or even thwart our plans and our need to engage with such change in church life.

### The Background

Part of that change is indicated in our Presbytery of Melrose and Peebles which has, along with every other Presbytery, been given the task of reshaping its allocation of clergy in the light of a 20% reduction in ordained ministers. Obviously, that means more congregations sharing ministers along with finding other ways of working together in the future. One option is to close some church buildings (which is happening in some parts of the country), while another is to link or unite more congregations together in clusters under one minister, or to create much larger groups of churches under a team ministry, with closures occurring at a future stage.

Since the General Assembly in May and the more 'radical call to action' all of this has taken on a faster pace. Conversations have taken place across this Presbytery from Carlops to St Boswells and Lauder down to Selkirk to enable local churches to have a voice in creating and shaping this new future.

### **The Proposals**

The team of people who have been leading this will be proposing a plan at the Presbytery meeting in December – the exact detail of which we do not know at this stage – but will certainly include proposals to reorganise the ways congregations are currently established. Some old linkages of churches may be unlinked to form new ones, while some which stood on their own will now be sharing ministry with others. And of pertinent interest to us, may be a proposal to link our three congregations with three neighbouring ones at Broughton, Skirling and Tweedsmuir. Representative elders from all the congregations have met recently on several occasions to talk through what this would mean. Although there remains a desire at the heart of every congregation that it might have its own minister, there is a growing and urgent sense of realism that ministers are going to have to be shared more widely. This also means the financial cost of a minister is shared where no single or two or three congregations could support a minister by themselves. If this kind of proposal goes ahead it means rethinking what we expect from or desire of a minister of word and sacrament, along with that of church leadership from elders especially and of our worship leaders.

All of this is not simply a case of 'the church from above' (be that Presbytery or Church Offices at 121), changing things for the sake of it and telling us what will be, but everyone seeking to grasp the reality of that which we face in our day. These are challenging times for congregations but also for ministers whose role is uncertain and whose 'parish' will cover a larger geographical area and more congregations than that of our predecessors and whose 'job description' will inevitably change.

### **The Planning**

In terms of our period of Interim Ministry it means some of the planning we have been doing will require reshaping and rethinking as we look towards a different outcome to that which was expected when I arrived. We will need to dovetail the ending of this interim period of ministry with the beginnings of conversations with new neighbours whoever they might be. Presbytery sought this Interim Ministry and so have the responsibility of concluding it before any new outcome begins. I am currently looking at how I might be able to remain with you awhile in order to assist in this if that were regarded as useful. A recent conversation with our Session Clerks was helpful, informative, supportive and instructive, and I will further this in speaking with Presbytery and with the staff and Committee which oversees Interim Ministry posts.

During this time, pray for one other and your church as well as for our neighbours in the faith that God will show us how best to be His presence in our communities in our generation and in the future.

A leaflet will be handed out at later date offering an Update on our Interim Ministry.

Christian Aid welcomes the new Scottish Climate Change Bill.

For many years, CA Scotland has been campaigning for the Scottish Government to take climate change seriously for the benefit of those around the world who are adversely affected by it. Since 2017, our supporters have met their MSPs, signed petitions, demonstrated outside the Scottish Parliament and taken to the streets in their

Here is an update on what our campaigning has achieved.

#### **Emission targets**

This Bill sets a strong long-term target to reduce emissions to net- zero by 2045 and drive action in the crucial next decade. We were particularly pleased to see all parties coming together on the day to increase the 2030 target to 75%. The last minute increase in ambition from Parliament was thanks to extensive public pressure, particularly

**Climate Justice** 

Around the world, the adverse effects of climate change are felt most acutely by people who are least responsible for causing the problem. Climate justice recognises that wealthy industrialised countries like Scotland have a historical responsibility for causing climate change and a moral responsibility to act faster and go further in cutting emissions. One of our campaign successes was the Government agreeing to put its own version of the principle of

A bill can only take us so far, it's what comes next that counts and we hope that you will join us on the next stage of the journey in pushing for immediate and rapid action on emissions and delivering climate justice.
