Introducing the Interim Moderator

Rev Malcolm Jefferson

I am delighted to be involved at Newlands as your Interim Moderator. Nancy Norman will have more pastoral contact with the congregation as locum but I hope to be able to connect with you in some way. I thought a helpful start would be to share a little about myself and a word of encouragement.

I am married to Hannah and we have two lovely children, Samuel and Millie. I enjoy playing football, mountain biking, being in the outdoors and laughing!

I have been the minister of St. Andrews Leckie and Lyne and Manor since 2012. I love Jesus and helping people to discover him. As a shy young man who was terrified to ever stand up before a crowd, I never thought that I would be a minister and was planning to train as an Educational Psychologist. However, when I was 20 (that's half my life ago if you want to guess my age!), I sensed that the Lord was saying to me, "You have your future all mapped out without asking me... I want you in a ministry of church leadership and preaching". It coincided with being given gifts for ministry (particularly in preaching), that previously I didn't have.

After spending a few years work as a full time youth worker with a church in Edinburgh, I eventually trained as a minister with the Church of Scotland.

John 15 "I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener.² He cuts off every branch of mine that doesn't produce fruit, and he prunes the branches that do bear fruit so they will produce even more.³ You have already been pruned and purified by the message I have given you.⁴ Remain in me, and I will remain in you. For a branch cannot produce fruit if it is severed from the vine, and you cannot be fruitful unless you remain in me.

you remain in me. ⁵ "Yes, I am the vine; you are the branches. Those who remain in me, and I in them, will produce much fruit. For apart from me you can do nothing."

As well as being a local minister, I am also Moderator of Presbytery this year and as many of our plans and normal activities are suspended, I want to encourage us to see this as an opportunity to reflect upon what makes the church fruitful. Perhaps we will discover that there are some things that the Lord would like us to lay down and some new things that he would like to lead us into. The key is to remain rooted in Jesus as the true vine. It is a challenging time for everyone and as God's people we are not immune to the discouragement and anxiety. Limitations on gathering with others and physical contact continue to starve us from having vital human needs met. We feel this keenly as the people of God, as we remain hungry for fellowship with one another and for corporate singing of God's praises and the special dynamic of His Presence that we know when we meet in Jesus' name.

However, our God is the God of all hope and all comfort. He is the Father of compassion and the wonderful thing about the hope that He gives to us, is that it is not dependent upon our circumstances nor our power of positive thinking. Christian hope is a fruit of the Holy Spirit that God Himself wants to grow within us. In other words, Christian hope comes from outside of us as a gift from God. We have a living hope in the person of Jesus Christ. Hope grows as we live in and with him. He is the author and giver of hope because he has been raised from the dead – he has already overcome the most hopeless of realities and shares with us his life that cannot be extinguished.

"May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit" (Romans 15:13).

Woke up this late September morning to the first signs of autumn and was reminded of the Keats poem "Ode to Autumn" from my school days. This morning truly was a season of mist and mellow fruitfulness as the sun was shining through the mist and making the dew sparkle on the remaining flowers here at Lamancha.

There are a few apples and plums still left to pick but as always flowers reign supreme in this garden and the star performers have been the white and lilac Phloxes with Heleniums just coming into bloom and boy, are those lupins doing well on their second flowering. Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness. Close bosom-friend of the maturing sun: Conspiring with him how to load and bless With fruit the vines that round the thatch-eaves run: To bend with apples the mossed cottage-trees. And fill all fruit with ripeness to the core: To swell the gourd, and plump the hazel shells With a sweet kernel: to set budding more, And still more, later flowers for the bees, Until they think warm days will never cease. For Summer has o'er-brimmed their clammy cell.

Buy a packet of seed and they will not let you down.

Petunias are past their best now and will be replaced with spring bulbs and winter pansies closely followed by polyanthus for the planters. (Looks like a day out to the local garden centre with lunch thrown in!)

Lamancha Community Garden shrubs were all carefully chosen for year round interest and this autumn the Euonimis Alatus is truly stunning with fiery red foliage. We can't grow Acers very well here but this more than makes up. The Big Hydrangea and Dogwoods have been lovely too especially the lime green one. The garden is open to all so please feel free to bring a flask if the weather is nice. Bring the kids as there is a play park next to the garden.
