God put faith in a body!

It's getting to that time of year again, Advent. A time when we are reminded of how God put faith in a body. John opens his gospel with the words, "*and the Word became flesh and lived among us.*" Matthew and Luke, in their gospels tell us, this all happened because God first put faith in a woman's body, a woman called Mary.

Know that God put faith in a body, it is somewhat odd that Christians so often speak of spirituality in disembodied terms? Why do we feel this need to separate the physical from the spiritual, damning one and lauding the other? Why do we assume that truly holy things are immaterial and invisible?

Bodies matter! In all of the 4 Gospels we read of Jesus feeding the hungry, cleansing the lepers, giving sight to the blind, opening the ears of the deaf and on occasions raising dead bodies back to life. He even dared to offer his own body as proof of his identity when he invited Thomas to touch his physical wounds.

Christian spirituality should never be portrayed as an escape from our bodies. But rather a deeper engagement with our own physicality and that of others.

So many today aren't comfortable in their own skins, (just ask the cosmetics industry). We don't seem to know what to make of or do with our bodies other than to compare them to others or submit them to the deeply destructive standards of what passes for beautiful and acceptable in contemporary society.

What's your relationship to your body like? Do you like your body? Are you listening to it? Do you respect and care for it? Do you see it as holy and beautiful? Do you have joy and gratitude for the gift of your body? In what ways are you inhabiting the amazing gift of your body?

I am asking these questions as we draw close to the Advent season because I don't think we can fully appreciate the wonderful gift of our bodies. Perhaps that's why we miss the wonder of the words - "and the Word became flesh and lived among us,".

Let me say it again - God put faith in a body!

Think on that this Advent season.

Wondering about Wandering



I have recently been wondering what makes a journey a pilgrimage. The word pilgrimage can be used to refer to a journey to a significant and special destination, but it can also be used to refer to the action of journeying. Last year I took a pilgrimage across the parish of West Tweeddale, stopping at 5 of the churches as I went. I walked 65 kilometres, (the parish covers a large and varied rural area!) The purpose of the walk was to journey across the parish, visit the churches and listen to God's voice as I went. I travelled from Carlops church in the north to Tweedsmuir Kirk in the south, on Roman roads, tarmacked roads, drove roads, ancient footpaths, forestry tracks, across fields and under a fair amount of rain. The parish felt steeped in history both ancient and more recent.

There is something special about being outside in nature that is good for our physical, emotional, mental and spiritual health. John Muir famously said, "I'd rather be in the mountains thinking of God, than in church thinking about the mountains". Many people find 'head space' and a connection with something big-ger than themselves more readily in the outdoors.

For the past three years I have led a church youth group in Broughtonknowe woods. I am grateful to the owner and the Friends of Broughtonknowe for their upkeep and our use of the woods. The young people find, in the woods, a space where they can explore faith for themselves and respond in an active and meaningful way. Gathering outdoors around a fire seems to help us connect both with each other, and the physical and spiritual world around us.

Over the next few months, I plan to start a similar gathering for all ages called **'Wanderings'**. This will entail going for led, reflective walk in the woods. These would be gatherings where people can connect life and faith: wondering and wandering together. Working in partnership with the churches of Upper Tweeddale, plans are shaping up to make this happen. Community buyout of Broughtonknowe Woodland

You may have heard that the woodland at Broughtonknowe is up for sale and that the community are trying to buy it. Here is a little bit of the history of the woodland, why it is up for sale, and why the community want to buy it. The woodland extends to 138 acres and was planted in the late 1980s with a mixture of native hardwoods and commercial softwoods. It was the vision of the late Major David Balfour-Scott who conceived the idea of a woodland with commercial potential softened by amenity and the beauty of native species. Once planted the wood immediately won awards for its forward-thinking vision.

Friends of Broughtonknowe Woodland (FoBW) was set up in 2021 to bring together like-minded people aiming to improve the woodland amenity and increase its biodiversity. With the aid of wind farm grant funding, nature trails and several new paths have been developed. A new pond has been dug and another significantly enlarged. Several board walks and mini bridges have been constructed over bogs and burns and new seating benches have been added along the various routes. A bird-watching hide has been erected next to one of the ponds.

In 2024, due to ill health, the current owner placed the woodland on the market but agreed to suspend marketing while the community investigated the feasibility of purchasing and operating it for community benefit. FoBW made a successful Stage 1 bid to the Scottish Land Fund for a detailed feasibility study. This demonstrated that community ownership is viable financially and that it will deliver significant additional benefits over the current, already successful, operation.

A key overarching motivation for community ownership of Broughtonknowe Wood is to ensure that the amenity and biodiversity enhancements already achieved by FoBW will be protected from development and that it will in perpetuity be owned and managed sustainably to deliver multiple community benefits for residents in neighbouring areas of the Borders and South Lanarkshire.

Key objectives following a successful community purchase are to:

1. Retain the woodland environment and make gradual transitions to increase the broadleaf/native woodland component while retaining a sound economic base of productive species that supports local employment and skills development.

2. Provide a 'forest school' which will offer environmental education activities such as tree planting days, bug hunts, pond dipping and outdoor events for local Primary and Secondary schools and adult interest groups.

3. Provide facilities for youth groups (currently the Scouts and Biggar Church Youth Group) to continue to meet in the "Fire Pit" area and to attract other groups such as the cubs and guides.

4. Rent out space within the shed to one or more private businesses to help retain and create employment within the local area.

5. Further develop volunteering opportunities to maintain the existing infrastructure.

Currently there is an application for significant funding from the Scottish Land Fund, but we know that even if this is successful, there will still be a need to raise a considerable amount of money. It is hoped that the two local windfarms will contribute, and several potential grant funders are being contacted. Once the outcome of the Scottish Land Fund grant application is known, a major local fundraising initiative will be launched.

Broughtonknowe Community Woodland Ltd is now a registered company, and it is hoped that within a couple of months, charitable status will be achieved.
